


Eastport Choice Neighborhoods Planning Grant

Existing Conditions Review and Visioning

YOUTH, RESIDENT, AND COMMUNITY MEETINGS SUMMARY

September 20 + 21, 2022





On September 21st and 22nd, residents from Eastport Terrace-Harbour House (ET-HH) and the surrounding Eastport neighborhood convened for a series of meetings and workshops to review the Existing Conditions data for the neighborhood and to begin the visioning process for transforming the neighborhood. Existing Conditions data was gathered from a broad range of sources and included preliminary findings from the ET-HH Resident Survey. Three meetings were held at the Eastport Community Center:

- 1) a Young Planners workshop on the afternoon of September 20, 2022,
- 2) an ET-HH Residents meeting on the evening of September 20, 2022, and
- 3) an Eastport Community meeting on the evening of September 21, 2022.

The agenda, meeting content, and activities were identical for both evening sessions, and Spanish interpreters were provided.

YOUNG PLANNERS



During the Young Planners workshop, ET-HH youth learned about neighborhood planning. The children participated in a walk of their community and a visioning session to brainstorm the features they want to see in the redeveloped site. The young planners then drew or wrote the different features and elements that they would like to preserve, remove, or add to their transformed neighborhood.

At the Resident & Community
Workshops, participants were
given a brief summary of the
planning process to-date,
then conducted a data stroll to
review the Existing Conditions
data boards. The boards were
organized in several categories:
Housing, Mobility, Open Space,
Neighborhood Features, Public
Safety, Education, Health &
Wellness, and Who Lives Here.

Participants then reconvened in small groups for animated discussions about what stood out to them from the data and what should be prioritized in the transformation plan for ET-HH and the surrounding Eastport target neighborhood based on the data.

Throughout the evening sessions, attendees participated in interactive visioning exercises such as "Postcards from the Future" in which they either wrote or drew images to their future self about how the neighborhood had transformed. Participants also selected and pinned images, wrote ideas, or drew pictures about elements they would like to see in the transformed neighborhood on a vision wall.

UNIT AMENITIES

- Larger bedrooms

REACTIONS TO DATA

- Surprised by smaller average family size at ET-HH (1.8 persons per household)
- o Perception of crime is a big concern that could prevent residents and businesses from moving to the neighborhood (*see separate crime category below)
- Significant health issues, but lack of health clinic or fitness activities
- o Large disparity in ET-HH income, education, health, employment vs. Neighborhood
- o Residents want to come back
- o Sense of community from residents
- O Crime data is quantitative and qualitative - Perception of crime is as important to quality of life as the actual statistics



NEIGHBORHOOD AMENITIES


- Fresh foods/grocery
- Better public transportation. Jobs are farther away, need shuttle buses, better routes/times
- Area to honor past residents
- o Keep the pool and Rec Center!
- Healthcare clinic/office
- o Reopen movie theater
- Shared spaces in the middle of the site will draw people in the from the neighborhood.
- Collective activities, such as neighborhood sports teams on-site, will bring parents together
- O Sidewalks neighborhood connectivity
- New street layout and through ways
- o Prioritize open space
- Water front/boat access
- o Prioritize activated green/open space
- O Playground with better lighting and equipment






PEOPLE AMENITIES
